INTERACTIVE SUNDAY SCHOOL OUTLINE FOR YOUTHS AND YOUNG ADULTS

Luke Chapter 6 (NIV)

Directions: - *Let the whole chapter be read first time you come together to study this chapter so that everyone could participate fully. Thereafter, the class may then be reading recommended verses as needed when answering the questions. The teacher should provide additional background information on the topic and come up with follow-up questions. Participants should be brief in their responses and use relevant Bible references to illustrate their points. They should be careful not to dominate the discussion to allow everyone to have an equal opportunity to participate.*

Read the chapter section by section and answer the questions that follow. Let everyone participate in the reading.

Discussion Questions:

1. Jesus Is Lord of the Sabbath (Verses 1 – 11) - Discuss the two events concerning the Sabbath – Let everyone say a few things that they found interesting in that section of the chapter.

The Twelve Apostles (Verses 12 – 16) - What did Jesus do before he chose the apostles? Name the apostles. Do you think it is important to pray before you choose your friends? Explain.

2. Blessings and Woes (Verses 17 – 26) - Discuss this section of the chapter. Which of the Beatitudes is the easiest for you to follow? Which is the most difficult for you? Explain your thoughts.

3. Love for Enemies (Verses 27 – 36) – Discuss this section of the chapter - Why do you supposed this could be difficult for you to do?

4. Judging Others (Verses 37 – 42) - Discuss this section of the chapter. Explain your thoughts about what Jesus was saying about the following (Condemnation; Forgiveness: Giving; Blind leading blind; Speck of sawdust).

5. A Tree and Its Fruit (Verses 43 – 45) - To what extent does the things we hear or watch or people we listen to regularly can have impact or affect our behavior? Discuss.

6. The Wise and Foolish Builders (Verses 46 – 49) - What does Jesus promise those who follow His advice? As youths and young adults, do we need to be concerned about those things.
